## Design Variations

The projects here build on those in Book One. Those projects showed Fit was controlled by two darts between the waist and the hip. These projects show how to:

- Change dart locations
- Change darts to seams
- Change seams to create different looks
- Create a skirt for the bottle and explore pattern design puzzles.

## Changing Darts



A dart is like an arrow that points to where the body changes.


1. Make a copy of the Master Pattern and draw lines for the new dart locations as shown.


2. Cut along the lines for the new dart locations.

3. Cut the fabric and remove the pattern.

4. Tape the original darts closed.

5. At the top of the fabric, cut notches down to the waistline.

## Changing Darts (cont'd)


7. To prevent fraying, tape the sides and bottom of the fabric.

8. Tape the new darts closed.

9. Place the fabric on the bottle with the tape showing. Now tape the waistband in place.

## Changing Darts to Seams



Seams go from one edge to another. Darts do not. When you change a dart to a seam, the seam should pass close to the point of the dart. Seams can be taped together just as you did for the darts.


1. On a copy of the Master Pattern, draw the seam lines you want.

2. Cut the towel along the seam lines.

3. Tape the pattern to a towel.

4. Tape the seams closed.

## Mixing Colors



Colored paper or fabric can be joined together with seams to make different designs. For this project, I used green, yellow, and orange paper.


1. Select three colors you want to use.

2. Cut the seams to separate the pieces. Reposition the clips.

3. Tape the pattern paper on top. Now clip the three sheets together.

4. Cut off the extra paper at the top and bottom of each pattern piece.

5. Trim the sides. Then reposition the clips.

6. Separate and label the pieces: L=Left, C=Center, $\mathrm{R}=$ Right. Finish the project as described for "Changing Darts to Seams".

## Decorative Seams



Seams can be added without changing the fit. They can be added to combine different materials or to change a look.

Sequence can be very important in putting together a Pattern Design.
When the sides of two separate pieces are the same length, they should be taped first. (See Step 8.)


1. Draw the design lines you want onto a copy of the Master Pattern. Then select the paper you want.

2. As you separate the pieces, adjust the clips to keep the papers in place.

3. Tape the pattern to the paper. Clip the edges of the two different colored papers together.

4. The project is now separated into different pieces.

5. Separate the paper on top from the piece on the bottom.

6. Separate the different colors, numbering the pieces as shown above.

## Decorative Seams (cont'd)


7. Choose the color combination you want.

8. First tape the edges that match each other.

9. Finish taping the seams together. Now add a waistband.

## Creating Skirts



You can create a skirt for the bottle by making two copies of the Master Pattern then taping the side edges together. In this example, the Master Pattern is placed on folded fabric to create the two copies.


1. Tape the pattern to the folded edge of the fabric.

2. Cut the fabric and tape it as described in "Using Fabric" in Book One.

3. Place the skirt on the bottle to tape the side seam, then turn the fabric right side out.
